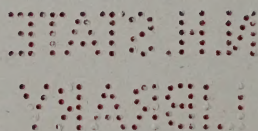

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Salisbury.

You are doubtless aware that there has been an unusual number of cases of contagious diseases during the past year in Salisbury. There have been reported to the Board of Health 12 cases of diphtheria, involving 9 different families, 2 cases of scarlet fever in one family and 1 case of measles. Under the existing laws, quarantine was necessarily established, lasting from 8 days to such times as the physicians in charge deemed expedient, hence the extra expense to which the town has been liable under the existing laws. We are glad to say at this time that no cases of contagious diseases exist in town.
