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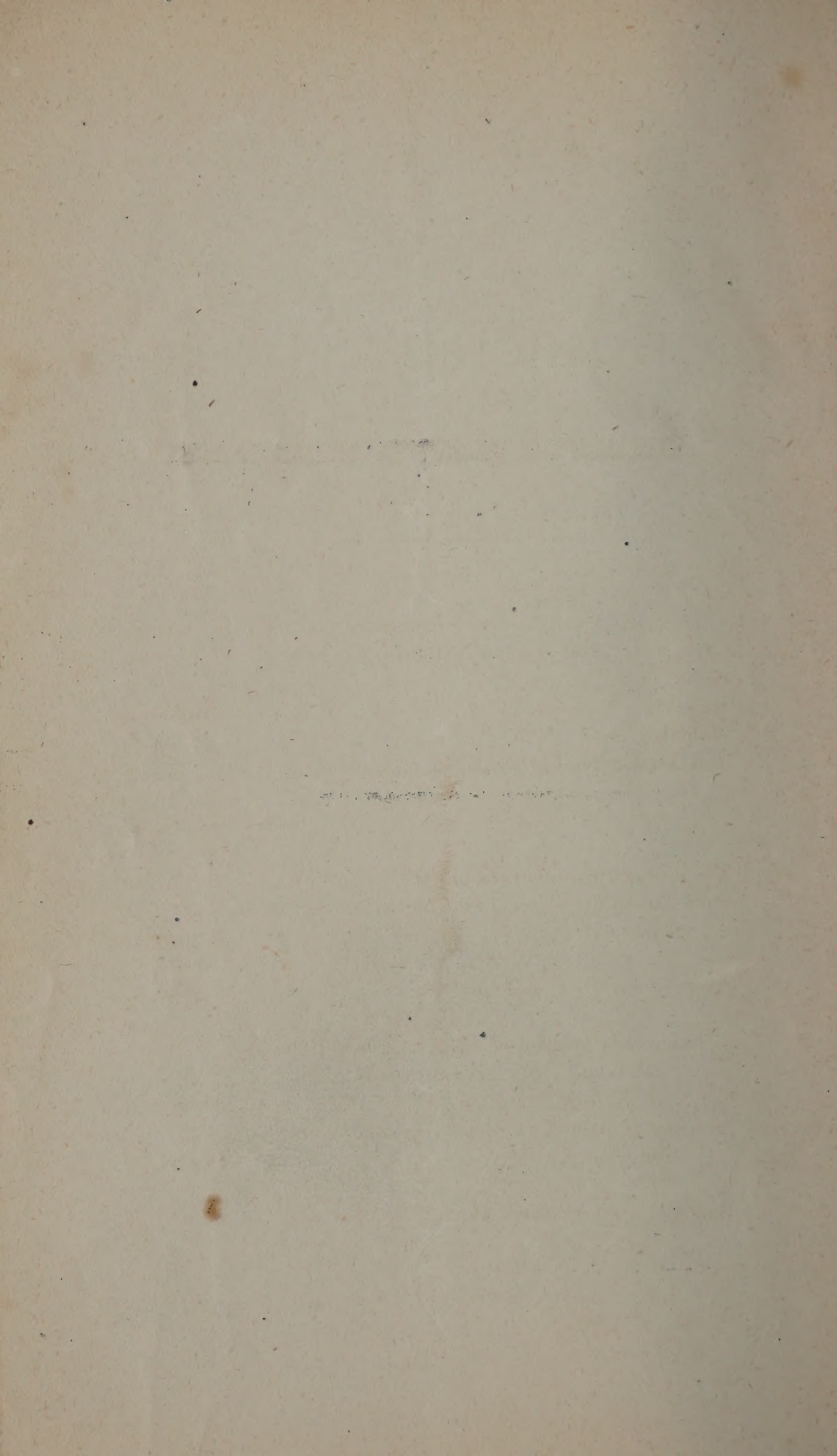

## Report of the Superintending School Committee of Salisbury.

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The following report upon the condition of the public schools in town is respectfully submitted.

There have been employed the past year, seventeen different teachers; six males and eleven females. Three of these (Miss Greeley, Mr. Locke and Mr. Bean,) have never taught before.

It is not my purpose to give my personal impression of each individual teacher, although it may prove a disappointment, to some of the younger members of the profession, not to find themselves specially noticed.

Most of the districts have been fortunate in obtaining teachers adapted to their particular school; for it is rarely the case, that a teacher will meet with the same success in all schools, unless it is a poor one that makes a failure everywhere.

It was a noticeable feature of a few of the examinations that the teacher was independent of the text book, or rather, used it only as a guide. The children were taught ideas, not words, and illustrations from the most common things were used to make the meaning apparent.

Progress in most of the schools, commendable; while in the matter of government they have moved along in their usually quiet, orderly manner, with one or two exceptions.

The winter term in District No. 2 proved a failure in school government. On Friday of the fourth week, the teacher closed school and sent in his resignation, in which

he gives his reason for doing so. He says, "My motive for doing this is not one of fear arising from my own inability to teach, or of the results that might arise from my continuing to do so; but I am convinced that *Justice* cannot and will not be done to any one connected with the school. I would take this occasion to characterize the petition that was circulated, as a base imputation (founded on hearsay) upon me, and also upon those that engaged and examined me. I consider every one who signed this petition, as supporting a rude and disorderly element in the school. I can heartily recommend Salisbury Centre Road school as a good field for a lover of missionary work." This is a severe, but rather truthful criticism, and in searching for the cause of this condition of affairs—are not the parents in this district more responsible for it than they are willing to admit. It is a true saying that "a child well governed at home, is more than half governed at school." Children rarely have trouble with their teachers, who have the right sort of home training. If parents, who alone are responsible for the education of their children, would in all suitable ways, manifest a greater interest in the school, visiting it occasionally, instead of listening to the children's stories, making an effort to always have the children there, and in season, furnishing them with necessary books, and providing a pleasant and comfortable school-room—we should have better schools.

It is a well known fact that most of our school-houses have outlived their usefulness. There are but three in town that can be regarded as fit for winter schools. Two have been entirely abandoned, and rooms in private dwellings rented for schools.

The subject has been discussed again and again by my predecessors, and earnest and urgent appeals made to the parents to care as much for the comfort of their children as they do for their cattle; but thus far it has been in vain. So I speak of it again in a hopeless sort of way, from a sense of duty, and because my sympathies are with the children, rather than for the good it will do.

The subject of text books demands special attention, as it



has been a number of years since any change has been made. The Geographies published twenty years ago (of which I have found a number of copies in school) are not at all what we need now.

Many things in our own country have been changed since then, and there are also changes in other countries. We need a reasonably modern Geography to keep pace with the times.

In accordance with the law "authorizing superintending school committees and selectmen to purchase for the use of their common schools, as many copies of the map of New Hampshire, as they may deem best, not exceeding one copy for each school," four such maps have been purchased at an expense of \$5 00 apiece, for Districts 1, 2, 3, and 4, each district paying for its own, from its school money. It is to be hoped that so much advantage will be derived from the use of these maps, that other districts will urge their claims for them.

If we could have a new text book on Grammar, Swintons Language Lessons, or any other suitable book for beginners, it might help to revive this study among our scholars which is to be feared will soon be among the "lost arts," as we have now scarcely twenty Grammar scholars in town. In several of the schools it is not taught at all.

I know it is entirely within the province of the committee to regulate the text books; but it is hard to do, because of the opposition it meets from parents and guardians.

For that reason a person who retains the office for only one year, dislikes to encounter the ill feeling, trouble and expense of making the change. I call your attention to these matters, hoping you will elect a committee who will have time to work with and for your schools, to make them what they should be. Our educational interests are of first importance. They lie at the foundation of our intelligence, our industrial enterprises, and our prosperity. Be not "Penny wise and proud foolish" in furnishing the means of their support.
