

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Salisbury Town Hall in said Salisbury on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To elect one selectman for three years.
4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for town maintenance of highways and bridges.
5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as the law requires for state aid maintenance of highways.
6. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as the law requires for state aid construction of highways.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Old Home Day.

9. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen power to borrow money upon the credit of the town up to \$10,000.

10. To elect one library trustee for three years.

11. To elect one trustee of trust funds for three years.

12. To hear reports of agents, auditor and officers heretofore chosen.

13. To see if the town will vote to pay the following salaries and wages:

Selectmen, \$3.50 per day.

Town treasurer, \$50.00 and bond.

Town clerk, \$35.00 and bond.

Tax collector, \$75.00 and bond.

Teams, \$5.00 per day.

Labor, \$2.50 per day.

Trucks, \$9.00 for first yard and \$2.00 per extra yard.

Supervisors, \$3.00 per day.

Snow-plow, 55c per hour and 35c per hour.

Auditor, \$3.00.

Moderator, \$3.50.

14. To see if the town will vote to give the following discounts on payment of taxes:

4% discount on three-fourths of 1931 tax on or before May 1st.

3% discount for payments before June 1st.

2% discount for payments before August 1st.

1% discount for payments before October 1st.

15. To bring in your votes for the election of delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars for Old Age Assistance.

17. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

At the present time the Heights School has twenty-seven pupils and the South Road School thirty. Both are being conducted well by teachers of training and experience.

The attendance table for 1930-31 shows a decided decrease in cases of tardiness, the lowest number in the twelve years in which I have known the Salisbury schools. During the current year tardiness has been much further reduced at South Road School, but is increasing decidedly at the Heights. Possibly this may seem a small matter to some parents, but a habit of promptness is worth careful cultivation.

As foreseen at the time of the last report, the per pupil cost of our schools was reduced last year to about three dollars less than the state median. In cost to the district on each \$1,000.00 of equalized valuation, Salisbury stands number sixty-seven from the lowest among the two hundred forty-three districts of the state.

By the School Board's Estimate the gross amount of money needed next year is \$625.00 less than last year's estimate, but it was possible to reduce the amount raised last year by an estimated cash balance of \$1,100.00 and State Aid of \$159.03. This year our estimated balance is \$100.00 and while a small amount of State Aid is due us it is more than balanced by unexpended balances we owe back to the State.
