TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Salisbury, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
 - 3. To elect one Selectman for three years.
- 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town maintenance of highways and bridges.
- 5. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for construction of the Class II road known as Warner Road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$757.50, or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$628.86.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the control of white pine blister.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Old Home Day.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of the 200th anniversary of the Town.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to borrow upon the credit of the Town up to \$10,000.
 - 10. To elect one Library Trustee for three years.
- 11. To elect one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and one Trustee of Trust Funds for two years to serve remainder of Mr. E. N. Sawyer's (deceased) term.
- 12. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors and Officers heretofore chosen.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money to reduce the Town Debt.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote (by printed ballot) to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of additional snow removing equipment.
- 16. To transact any other business which may come before said meeting.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money for the purchase of additional tractor and snow plew.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

The School Board's budget for the coming year calls for the raising of practically the same amount of money as was raised last year and the year before that.

The amount asked for to support elementary schools (\$3,243.00) is a few dollars above the \$5 tax which must be raised to secure state aid, this tax being \$3,200.15.

We can now be pretty certain that our expenditures for elementary schools for the year ending next June will not exceed the amount of this tax, so no state aid will be needed for the current year. The cost of our elementary schools is so close to the amount of the \$5 tax that it is very difficult to say in advance, from year to year, whether we shall qualify for state aid or not. This year, for example, if we had paid \$50 more for teachers' salaries we would have received a reimbursement of \$22.87 from the state.

So long as we cannot support satisfactory schools on less than the \$5 tax it is important that we make certain that \$5 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation is raised each year. An unforeseen emergency, such as the need of another school or another transportation route may make it necessary to spend an amount considerably in excess of the \$5 tax. In that case, it would be unfortunate if we had not qualified for state aid.

The increasing cost of high school tuition has to be met entirely by local taxation, as the laws provide no state aid for any items except approved expenditures for the support of the Elementary schools.

In the Attendance Table the low per cent of attendance at the South Road School is caused for the most part by the great amount of sickness during November, December and January of last year. For the first 22 weeks of the current school year the per cent of attendance at South Road is 93.42 and at the Heights,

95.80. The Heights School has had almost no tardiness this year, while the South Road School, at the present rate, will have about the same amount as last year.

The Reading system introduced at the Heights last year is now used also at South Road.

Children in a city school system may have a different teacher every year without any change in the teaching staff. In one-room rural schools a child may have only one teacher during his entire elementary school course. As a general rule, I believe he should have more than one teacher. This can be arranged without losing good teachers from our town by occasionally transferring teachers from one school to another as was done in Salisbury last September.
